	 Joanna Miller welcomed CSC members.
	 Joanna invited CSC members and guests to introduce themselves and then provided an overview of the agenda.
2	Centerra Gold & Mount Milligan Update
	AuRico Acquisition - Joanna Miller
	 Centerra Gold Inc. acquired AuRico Metals in January 2018 and is now the 100% owner of the Kemess Underground Project. The company is working through the integration process and hope to have shared services at a regional level. Looking to expand the Prince George office to accommodate the regionalization.
Í	Mount Milligan Employment, Health & Safety Update (Attachment One) - Chelsea Ogilvie
	 There are 534 full time employees as of February 2018, an increase from 524 in September. Of those, 86% are male and 14% are female. The workforce is comprised of 12% Mackenzie, 14% Fort St James, 5% Vanderhoof, 24% Prince George, 8% Fraser Lake residents, 2% are national, and 34% come from remainder of BC. 14.9% of the workforce is Aboriginal, of which 0.7% is McLeod Lake, 6.4% is Nak'azdli Whut'en and 7.8% are from other Aboriginal groups. Mount Milligan's All Incidents Recordable Rate for 2017 was 1.22
	Mount Milligan Community Development/Engagement Update - Chelsea Ogilvie and Joanna Miller
	 Mount Milligan is currently developing two pre-employment mine training programs; one in partnership with McLeod Lake and the CNC Mackenzie and the other is in partnership with Nak'azdli Whut'en and the CNC Fort St. James. Both programs will be offered to members of the respective First Nations. The programs have been designed to align with the seasonal labour needs of the mine and the request from the communities to have real work opportunities available for graduates. Four 8-month work terms will be available to graduates from both programs Roger Pomerleau, the new Training Superintendent is involved. Centerra is moving forward with a developing a searchable local supplier database, which will include businesses from Fort St. James, Mackenzie, Vanderhoof and Fraser Lake. We are working with Centerra Gold's Supply Chain Dept. to build the database. Local businesses will be required to register online and will have registration fees waived. This will help both our Supply Chain Dept. as well as the end users of good and services to understand what is available in our local communities. Centerra is planning a number of events in the month of May to celebrate BC Mining Month, including community BBQs and mine tours.
	CSC questions and comments:
	${f Q1:}$ The number of employees coming from the "Rest of BC" is up, but the number from Mackenzie is down. Why is this?

- A1: We increased headcount this year, and that contributes to the shift in percentages from each area. We have also started running a bus from Smithers which might have an impact on where people are applying and getting hired from. It can also be difficult to find local candidates for highly specialized positions.
- **Q2:** You have always been transparent about having to go further afield for expertise. Is there a way to track the amount of specialized versus non-specialized hires? I am hearing of lots of people from the local communities not getting jobs even though they have the qualifications.
- A2: Yes, we can get more statistics for you on local employment.
- C3: You are good at doing outreach in the schools, but there doesn't seem to be any recruitment in the communities.
- R3: We have heard this request before and will look into what we can do to increase our recruitment presence in our local communities.
- Q4: We have been hearing about more shifts at the mine that are offered on a rotation of 2 weeks on and 2 weeks off Is this going to be more common? The point of 1 week on and 1 week off was to keep the focus on hiring locally.
- A4: The 2 week rotation has been offered to a few new employees, but We are not sure how this will look moving forward. Kemess will be on a 2 and 2 rotation. I recognize that the 7 on, 7 off rotation was chosen for a specific reason and will continue to ensure that our hiring managers understand the commitment made to hire locally.
- **Q5:** What is the total number of employees on site? Is there a way we can see this tracked month over month/year over year?
- A5: There are 534 fulltime employees at Mount Milligan. Yes, we can present the stats as graphs that track the data over time.
- **Q6:** Can we get a review of the explanation for the AIRR calculation?
- A6: Yes, we will review this calculation again at our next meeting.
- Q7: Are you including travel to and from site in your incident stats? We have lost 3 truck drivers this winter so we are concerned with safety on the roads.
- A7: Our bussing information is tracked and if anything were to happen during travel to or from site it would undergo a full investigation.
- **C8:** Any information involving the roads can be helpful to improving road safety. Even something seemingly random like hitting a moose can have an underlying cause of a saltlick in the wrong place, so it is important to be tracking this information.
- **Q9:** Can we get the breakdown of regional spend versus money going to locally owned businesses, because it would be great to have some baseline data.
- A9: Yes, we can do that.

Mount Milligan Environmental Update: Philip Lake 1 Pipeline & Upcoming Permitting - Tim Caldwell (Attachment Two)

- Tim provided an update on the water situation at the mine, including current and planned permitting activities.
- The pipeline to Philip Lake 1 has been constructed and has recently started drawing water. This will help to support the water needs of mine. The mine is currently

- permitted to draw water from Philip Lake 1 until October 2018, but we are proposing to extend the authorization.
- Annual environmental reports are currently being completed for all mine sites. Reports are due at the end of March.

CSC questions and comments:

Q10: What species of fish are in Philip Lake 1? Did you find Kokanee?

A10: There are burbot, rainbow trout, minnow species, lake trout, but no Kokanee were identified in the last survey. We will be repeating a fish The last fish survey was done 9-10 years ago though, so we will be redoing it this spring to see if there are the same species in there.

Q11: What is the threshold where you stop taking water out of Philip Lake 1?

All: The maximum drawdown is 2.3cms outside of natural variation. The lake trout lay eggs on the edge of the lake and we want to ensure they aren't impacted. We are noticing natural fluctuations in lake levels above what was expected and will need to amend our short term authorization to reflect a new lake level. This number has not yet been determined and will be assessed by experts.

Q13: What is happening in the Environmental Assessment process?

A13: Amendment #3 of our Environmental Assessment Certificate was approved for water withdrawal this winter. We will be applying for another amendment for groundwater withdrawal for the life of mine. Another amendment will be sought to extend our short-term water withdrawal from Philip Lake 1 and Meadows Creek.

Q14: Does this group need to lobby anyone for any of these permits?

A14: We appreciate the ongoing offering of support of the CSC.

Q15: Would a schedule for all of this be helpful to add to the agenda moving forward?

A15: Yes, let's get it beforehand so that we can direct the conversation.

4 Kemess Underground Project Update - Claudette Gouger (Attachment Three)

CSC questions and comments:

Q16: Is this project going to be the same as underground coal mining? Because Tumbler Ridge is running a big training course.

A16: This is block cave mining, and we will be doing most training in-house.

5 Mount Milligan Community Project Fund - Application Review

Prior to reviewing the spring 2018 applications, members discussed past applications with funds still on hold. These organizations will be contacted, and depending on the status of their project, the hold of funds may be removed and they will be required to reapply once the project moves forward.

Eight applications to the Community Project Fund were received by the February 1, 2018 deadline for the spring intake period. The Committee discussed each application in detail and decided that the Fund should not cover expense such as travel. The Fund application form and criteria document will be updated to reflect these decisions.

Each application was evaluated by the CSC and ranked from 1 to 8. . The following table summarizes the ranking and amount of funding granted by the Committee.

7 CSC Community Updates:

The CSC members reported on activities in their respective communities since the last meeting in October 2017.

McLeod Lake (KS)

- There has been a lot of change in personnel at McLeod Lake Indian Band (MLIB). Bob Inkpen is the interim Band Manager and Economic Development advisor. A wellrespected councillor recently passed away and a new councillor will be sworn in next week.
- Amanda Chingee is working with PGNAETA on trades programs.
- Ken Solonas has applied for other positions within the Band. His continued membership on the CSC is dependent on the outcome of those applications.
- Planning for the Annual General Assembly will start soon, and the tentative dates will be August 8-10.

District of Mackenzie (DS)

- The Recreation Centre upgrade is proceeding on time and on budget. The pool will open the week of March 26th and the overall project is expected to be completed by this fall. Further grant funding has been acquired to support weight room upgrades as well as a climbing wall.
- The District was approved for \$128,000 in grant funding to upgrade the current Morfee Waterfall Trail. This will create a more accessible trail with better signage, brushing and trail clearing. This project is expected to be completed by the end of September.
- The District Trails Master Plan will be finalized soon and will create a strategy for future trail development. The District is excited to continue trail development projects this summer after the success of the Morfee Lake Trail and Little Mac Mountain Bike Trails.

• The District is creating a Structure Protection Unit to be deployed during wildfire season as needed. The Unit will be used for training, protection of infrastructure, green spaces and high wildfire risk areas.

District of Vanderhoof (HI)

- Council is putting a skate park across from the pool. They are currently seeking funding.
- There are Smart Burning workshops next week and money for pellet stoves as an effort to improve air quality, which is an ongoing issue.

District of Fort St. James (KN)

- Canfor is requesting that the Province turn the North Road into a Forest Service Road. This is an important topic for the community. There have been meetings at private residences, but so far no Canfor has held no public meetings.
- The housing report is now finished.
- The hospital is on the list for upgrades and we now have 6 physicians.

Q16: We are very interested in attending community meetings concerning Canfor's proposal for the North Rd. Can the District of Fort St. James make sure we are kept in the loop once a date has been set?

A16: Yes, I will send you the information when I get it.

College of New Caledonia - Fort St James (ES, TM)

- Experiencing some stalls in our funding applications due to transition in provincial government.
- The College is very excited about the new Digital Delivery Initiative (DDI), which allows us to share courses between campuses. We have 7 university-level courses that students can take during the upcoming summer intersession.
- Working with SD91 to implement Discovery programming. Have the goal of getting more students in the buildings, but also having them be more successful.
- Q17: What is the catchment area for DDI?
- A17: Vanderhoof and Fort St. James directly, but we can connect with other communities.
- Q18: Have you had much uptake in the free high school upgrading courses?
- A18: Yes we have. In Fort St. James we actually have a waiting list for some courses. We aren't sure if this has something to do with the mine now requiring grade 12.
- C18: The company is looking at a regional standard for education requirements, since Kemess does not require grade 12.
- Q19: Can employees starting at the mine in entry level positions receive support to upgrade, at camp for example?
- A19: Yes, we have talked about that in the past and will look into this.

City of Prince George (TM)

Housing stats are up, and there are plans for new housing and new hotels in the City.
 We are seeing a record number of housing permits.



Geographic Range










Contractor Demographics




Contractor Gender



AIRR for All Mines in BC End of November 2017 YTD








Employment Demographics

Jan 2017-Feb 2018










Local Hiring Stats % of Workforce Jul 2015-Jan 2018


MTM Employee Demographic (% of Total Workforce) Jul '15-Jan '18






